Course Description and Objectives:

The purpose of this course is to introduce students to the wide variety of different genres, modes, and histories of literature around the world. As the first part of a two-part course, this class overviews World Literature in translation from the beginning of human history until the dawn of the modern times. This cross-cultural journey increases students' knowledge and understanding of various Western and non-Western literary traditions, equips them with tools of literary analysis, and teaches them the basics of critical reading.

Texts:

Norton Anthology of World Literature, Third Edition, Vols. A, B, C (Required. Available at SUB Bookstore)

Attendance, Absences, and Missed Grade Components:

Regular attendance is essential for optimal performance in any course. Be aware that unexcused absences will result in partial or total loss of the grade for the "attendance and participation" component(s) of a course, as well as for any assignments that are not handed-in or completed as a result.

In this course, regular attendance of the class lectures is very important. Students only have <u>one</u> absence allowance throughout the semester. Any more absences from the class will lead to partial or total loss of the participation segment of the course grade (10%), unless the student has a valid excuse for his/her absence (e.g., health problems, serious emergency case, serious domestic issues). Planning conflicts or being too busy with assignments of other courses <u>do not</u> count as valid excuse for absence.

Policy for Late Assignments:

Students who consult **in advance** with an instructor regarding contingencies preventing the timely completion of an assignment may, at the discretion of the instructor, be granted an extension **just one time** throughout the course with no penalty. Otherwise, all assignments should be handed in on the stated deadline. The penalty for late submission of assignments is 5% per day. Example: An essay that is worthy of grade "A" (~92%) will be graded "A-" (~87%) if submitted one day late, and "B+" if submitted two days late. Late excuses will **not** be accepted for any reason.
