Explanatory Notes on Assignments:

Participation and attendance: You are expected to attend and actively participate in class. This includes:

- 1. Thoroughly preparing all work assigned for each class session
- 2. Contributing actively to class discussion and activities. This includes not only regularly sharing your own thoughts about what we read, but also listening attentively and responding to your classmates' ideas.

Important note: Disruptive behaviour in class is a sign of disrespect both to the instructor and to your fellow students, and will not be tolerated. Activities such as chatting, surfing the Internet, using or frequently checking your phone, studying for another class, etc. will result in a low participation grade. Cell phones should be turned OFF during class, and should remain put away.

Presentations: Twice during the semester, students will give short presentations in class, with a partner or in small groups. Detailed instructions and grading criteria will be provided by the professor ahead of time.

Short papers: each student will prepare two short essays over the course of the semester. Detailed instructions and grading criteria will be provided by the professor.

All work is due **in class**, on the day for which it has been assigned. Work turned in after class on the due date will be assessed a 5% penalty, with an additional 5% assessed for each subsequent day of lateness. Students who consult **in advance** with the instructor regarding contingencies preventing the timely completion of an assignment may, **at the discretion of the instructor**, be granted an extension.
