Explanatory Notes on Assignments:

Attendance, Participation, Preparation, and Homework

Regular attendance is essential for optimal performance in a foreign-language course. Students are expected to participate fully in all aspects of class work and assignments. That means coming to class prepared, viewing the assigned films and reading all texts carefully in advance, doing written or oral homework diligently, participating in group work, and contributing meaningfully to class discussions.

Roundtable Debate

Each student is expected to participate in a roundtable discussion on a specific topic by preparing a 5-7 minute statement and by actively engaging in the debate following the short presentations. The statement should give an introduction to and overview of the topic including important facts and dates; it should then focus on a specific aspect and introduce an assumption or opinion, and finally articulate related questions that will be discussed during the debate.

Term papers

One term paper is due after term. This academic, researched based should reflect and elaborate on the objectives and materials learned and used in class and develop this further. It should display a structured argument with a compelling thesis and insightful conclusion. You are expected to use secondary sources, articles and books. To choose a topic, please contact the instructor in advance. The paper should be 20 pages (double spaced) in length.

Creative Project

In this course students will be asked to complete a group project (2-3 students per group) on the topic of their respective roundtable. Topics will be discussed in class.

Presentation

Students will be asked to give one extensive presentation on a topic of their choice but outside the material covered by the undergraduates in GERM 451. The topic, design and form of the presentation will be discussed with the instructor.

Late excuses will not be accepted for any reason.
