Course Description and Objectives:

This course introduces students to the major issues being analyzed and debated within the discipline of Cultural Studies and will provide them with the terminology and theoretical tools to examine general topics within the fields of language, literature, linguistics, folklore, and translation. Emphasis is placed on interdisciplinary approaches to exploring how culture and cultural processes are shaped, distributed, and responded to in diverse ways. Through discussion, case studies, and writing, the class investigates these varied dimensions of culture. Key concepts pertaining to the study of culture, such as signs, image, representation, identity, otherness, power, nation, minority, race, gender, canon, and popular culture will be dealt with.

Texts:

Required: The Cultural Studies Reader (Third Edition), edited Simon During (Routledge, 2007). The course will use additional texts and visual materials provided by the instructor.
