

Course Description and Objectives:

SWED 111 is designed to develop ability in reading and writing Swedish, with a strong emphasis on the development of comprehension and oral communication skills. During this process, the student participates in a wide variety of interactive activities and is also exposed to contemporary Swedish culture. This course not only encourages the student to think critically about the principles of grammar as they relate to the Swedish language, but also stimulates an in-depth understanding of the principles by which language functions in general. Materials: textbook, workbook, film and recordings including music and spoken word.

****In this course,*** student/instructor communication is important. If a student knows of upcoming absences, the instructor should be notified. Moreover, in this course attendance and participation go hand in hand. When a student is absent, his/her level of participation in class cannot be assessed. The 15% allotted for attendance and class participation is based on effort and active engagement shown when in attendance.

Policy for Late Assignments/Homework:

Students who consult **in advance** with an instructor regarding contingencies preventing the timely completion of an assignment may, at the discretion of the instructor, be granted an extension **just one time** throughout the course with no penalty. However, if a second excuse will be granted for late assignments, half of the mark assigned for this particular work will be deducted. Otherwise, all assignments should be handed in on the stated deadline. Any assignment not handed-in in time or unexcused late assignments will not be given any marks. Late excuses will **not** be accepted for any reason.”

*****Homework:***

Homework is an integral part of foreign language acquisition. From the first day in a language classroom you are building a foundation of skills to prepare yourself for the next level. As a general rule homework assignments will be checked everyday at the beginning of class. Credit for assignments will be determined in the following manner: complete assignment 100%, partial assignment 75% and no assignment 0%.

Marks for assignments, tests, and exams are given in percentages, to which letter grades are also assigned, according to the table below (“**MLCS Undergraduate Grading Scale**”).
