# **Course Description and Objectives:**

This course, through the reading and discussion of texts in French from various genres (prose, poetry, essay, article), will present issues of belonging (migration and identity) in Francophone cultures, with a special focus on children this term. This course adopts an "integrated approach", combining the study of language, culture, literature and linguistics, in order to provide students with general applied skills in French. This means that, in addition to readings, lectures and inclass group discussions, students will be expected to complete exercises on a weekly or biweekly basis to hone their reading, writing, speaking and listening skills, with a special focus on grammar because, as it will be shown, grammar carries meaning. Most of the material will be posted on e-class and the rest distributed in class.

By the end of the course students will know how to write short reading reports and formal

essays in French. They will have gained more confidence in reading, writing and speaking French, and they will have learned about key francophone authors as well as how to think about identity issues in French-speaking regions and countries

# **Explanatory Notes on Assignments:**

# 1) Writing Exercises

There will be six in total on various topics related to the course. They will be very short (400 words max.) but you are expected to be very careful about all grammar rules. **These will all handed in by e-mail, typed and double-spaced**. If time allows I may assign an optional 7<sup>th</sup> exercise whose mark would replace your worst mark obtained in the first six if it is higher.

# 2) Two written assignments

The assignments will be relatively brief essays (4-6 pages) with a choice of possible topics; some of the weekly exercises will be devoted to essay-writing skills; only **typed**, **doubled-spaced paper** copies will be accepted.

# 3) Final Exam

More information will be provided but, whatever the format, it will be cumulative.

Please note that you will only receive letter grades in this course, no percentages.

**In this course,** we will engage into active learning with individual and group activities. Your participation mark will be based on attendance and the following:

Attendance: deductions will be made for more than 3 absences without legitimate excuses, such as illness or accidents. When in doubt it is best to contact the instructor by e-mail.
