Course Description and Objectives:

The aim of Italian 211 is to consolidate knowledge of Italian grammar, develop further skills in reading, writing, listening, speaking and expose students to Italian social and cultural aspects through stories, film and other material. Emphasis throughout the course will be on reading, writing and class discussion of stories, videos and other material. By the end of the course, students should be able to communicate more effectively in both oral and written Italian.

Explanatory Notes:

1. Attendance and Participation: Regular attendance is essential for optimal performance in a foreign-language course. Instructor keeps record of all missed classes. Participation is based on the ability of the student to collaborate with the instructor and classmates on a daily basis in order to facilitate the learning process, and to actively take part in all classroom activities. Students are responsible for coming to class prepared.

2. Short Compositions: You will be assigned 4 short compositions (circa 150 wds each) during the course of the term. You will hand them in to the instructor for corrections and comments. You will choose the best 3 re-written compositions to be handed in second last week of term.

3. Homework: Students will be asked to hand in assignments, either from the textbook or from other material provided by the instructor. Students are responsible for completing and handing in these assignments on time.

4. Tests and Mid Term: Tests and Mid-Term are designed to assess students’ skills and will be based on the material covered in class. Students will take two in-class tests and one Mid-Term (cumulative) as indicated in the above.

5. Oral presentation: Students are responsible for a 10 minutes oral presentation either alone or in pairs. The topic of the presentation should be agreed upon with instructor in advance. Dates of presentations must be strictly observed.

6. Final Oral Exam: During the last week of classes the instructor will conduct a circa 10-minute oral exam with students. Sign your name on the sheet outside instructor's door.

7. Final Exam: Students will take a cumulative 2-hour Final Exam on December 14, 2017. Please note that unexcused absence from Final Exam will result in a grade of ZERO.
