**Course Description, Objectives and Expected Learning Outcomes:**

*RUSS 111 is an introduction to the Russian language and culture. The main goal of this course is to help you develop basic communication skills in Russian. We will focus on listening comprehension, speaking, reading, writing, and cultural literacy. At the end of the course, you will be able to read and understand short texts and engage in brief conversations on everyday topics.*

**Explanatory Notes on Assignments:**

**Participation/Attendance 15%:** In-class and online participation is vital to your success in this course. It will be evaluated several times during the course. In-class participation includes not only evidence of individual preparation and attention, but also contributing to group work. It is important that you review and study the materials on a daily basis. Plan to spend about two hours every day on practicing Russian (reviewing materials, studying grammar, learning vocabulary, etc.).

**Homework (10%):** Each student will receive a grade, when appropriate, for homework assignments. Homework will consist of traditional and/or online exercises. Students are responsible for making up work that is missed due to excused absence. The work to be made up must be handed in the day the student returns to class. Written homework will be collected at the beginning of class.

**Mini-Quizzes 15% and Chapter Tests 30%:** There will be three chapter tests in this course (each worth 10%) and one or two quizzes per week. These tests are designed to assess a variety of skills, which are practiced during the course of study, including listening comprehension, reading comprehension, vocabulary, grammar structures, and writing. Tests and quizzes can only be made up if your instructor is informed prior to the test date and decided to excuse your absence.

**Oral Final Exam 10%:** This oral exam is designed to assess your communicative abilities in Russian. The exam will resemble the oral activities that you have done in class to that point. The oral final exam will be done individually and take place outside of class time. You will receive details about signing up and preparing as we approach the exam.

**Written Final Exam 20%:** The written final exam is cumulative, and similar in format to the chapter tests. It will assess listening comprehension, reading comprehension, vocabulary, grammar structures, and writing.
