Course Description, Objectives and Expected Learning Outcomes: Italian 111 is an introductory course intended for students with no previous knowledge of the language. If you have previous formal or informal knowledge of the language, please consult with the language coordinator Dr. Patrizia Bettella (pbettell@ualberta.ca) about selecting the appropriate course for you. The Department will withhold credit

from students completing courses for which prior background is deemed to make them ineligible. Not to be taken by:

- native or near native speakers
- students with credit in Ital 100, or with Italian 30 or its equivalent in Canada and other countries.

Objectives: at the end of this course, you will:

- have developed some basic communicative skills
- have learned to understand others and express yourself in spoken and written Italian at a beginner level
- use Italian to communicate in a wide range of contexts
- have acquired basic grammatical structures and vocabulary
- have developed cultural competency on the Italian context

Course Format: Blended Learning

Method of Language Acquisition:

ITAL 111 uses a blended approach. The includes three hours per week (Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays) of Face-to-Face (F2F) lesson and two hours (Tuesdays and Thursdays) of Lab, i.e. independent study (Self-Study) on e-Class. Students complete independently the Self-Study activities assigned on e-Class. The timely (before the next F2F lesson) completion of the Self-Study activities is essential for progress and success in this course. Self-Study activities are not optional, they are worth 10% of your Grade.

Explanatory Notes on Assignments:

PARTICIPATION, PREPARATION: You are expected to attend Face to Face (F2F) class on Mondays, Wednesdays, Fridays, regularly and punctually. On Tuesdays and Thursdays, you will complete the Self-Study-Lab activities listed on e-Class at your own pace. The completion of the Self-Study activities is mandatory and is part of your grade for participation and preparation. In-class participation includes evidence of individual preparation and attention, and contribution to individual and in group work. In case of potentially excusable absences notify your instructor by e-mail as soon as possible, or within 1 day.

SELF-STUDY/LAB: includes the activities listed on e-Class and assigned online to be completed on Tuesdays and Thursdays. All Self-Study activities must be completed before the next F2F lesson. You cannot learn and make good use of class time without daily preparation. Please follow deadlines.

MINI-QUIZZES: mini-quizzes will be assigned regularly on eClass on Fridays to assess what was learned during the week.

UNIT TESTS: There will be two unit-tests based on material from each chapter; they are intended to assess various skills practiced during the course. Tests cannot be made up if absence is unexcused. Please note the unexcused absences result in a grade of ZERO.

TASKS: in order to assess communicative skills, students will complete three tasks in the course of the semester. The First task (written) will be worth 4%. Second (oral) will be worth 6%. The third task (written) will be worth 5%. For details on each task please see e-Class.

FINAL ORAL EXAM: Is designed to assess oral performance, communicative competence. It will be done in pairs or individually. See details on e-Class

FINAL WRITTEN EXAM (DURATION 2 HOURS): this cumulative exam is based on the units and on all other material covered during the fall term. Please note that dates of final exams are very strictly followed. In case of unexcused absence from Final exams students receive a grade of ZERO.

Attendance, Absences, and Missed Grade Components:

Regular attendance is essential for optimal performance in any course. In cases of potentially excusable absences due to illness or domestic affliction, notify your instructor by e-mail within two days.
