Course Description, Objectives and Expected Learning Outcomes:

The aim of Italian 211 is to consolidate knowledge of Italian grammar, develop further skills in reading, writing, listening, speaking and expose students to Italian social and cultural aspects through stories, film and other material. Emphasis throughout the course will be on reading, writing and class discussion of stories, videos and other material. At the end of the course, successful students will be able to communicate more effectively in both written and oral Italian. Students will be able to write short compositions, to read semi-authentic texts, to present orally, to understand and communicate at intermediate level.

Course format: the objectives of this course will be learned from a combination of formal lectures, assigned readings, audiovisual materials, online components.

Explanatory Notes on Assignments:

1. Attendance and Participation: In-class participation is vital to your success in this course. You are expected to participate by interacting with your classmates and the instructor, doing a variety of activities. In-class participation includes not only evidence of individual preparation and attention, but also contributing to group work.

2. *Dossier of Short Compositions:* students will be assigned 3 short compositions (at least 150 words) during the course of the term, each is worth 7%. The compositions will be completed in 2 stages: the first draft will receive feedback from the instructor, so that students can then prepare the second draft for the dossier to be handed-in on December 8 2021.

3. Homework: Students will be asked to complete assignments from the textbook's website or from other material provided by the instructor. Students are responsible for completing assignments on time.
4. Forum Posts: in order to promote community, debate and writing, students will participate in discussion by writing comments and replying to each other. Three Forum Posts will be assigned by the instructor on e-Class at specific dates. Forums posts are marked for completion, each one is worth 2%.
5. Tests: Unit Tests are designed to assess students' skills and will be based on the material covered in class. Students will take three in-class tests, each one worth 10%. Please note that unexcused absences will result in a grade of ZERO.

6. *Oral presentation:* Students are responsible for a max. 10-minute oral presentation in pairs. The topic and format of the presentation will be agreed upon with instructor in advance and are shared on GoogleDoc. Use of video/audio support should be very limited and will be discussed in advance with instructor. Dates of presentations must be strictly observed.

7. *Final Oral Exam:* During the last two weeks of class, at a time to be agreed with instructor, students will take a circa 10-minutes oral exam.

Attendance, Absences, and Missed Grade Components:

Regular attendance is essential for optimal performance in any course. In cases of potentially excusable absences due to illness or domestic affliction, notify your instructor by e-mail within two days.
