## **Course Description, Objectives and Expected Learning Outcomes:**

The Irish courses in MLCS are supported by the Ireland Canada University Foundation (ICUF), and offer the opportunity to discover the ancient Gaelic linguistic and cultural roots of Ireland, while at the same time getting to know the modern world of Irish speakers and the progressive new Ireland of today.

Successful students will be able to speak about themselves, others and the world around them in Irish, read and pronounce Irish words, phrases, poems and songs and will have gained an appreciation for the role of the Irish language in Ireland and globally in the past, present and future.

## **Course Format:**

The objectives of this course will be learned from a combination of formal lectures, assigned readings and audiovisual materials all delivered in the form of remote learning until such time as it is possible to move the classes to in-person delivery. Students will be made aware of the eventual change to the mode of delivery in good time.

#### **Explanatory Notes on Assignments:**

Participation/attendance 10%: The focus of this course will be on communication and comprehension and as such students are encouraged to participate actively in class with their camera on, ready to learn and contribute. Students will be made aware of upcoming assessments in good time and are expected to complete these assignments by the deadline unless exceptional circumstances apply.

Quizzes 20%: After each topic, or as deemed necessary, you will complete a quiz on eClass. The quizzes are designed to assess a variety of skills which are practiced during the course of study, including listening comprehension, reading comprehension, vocabulary, grammar structures, writing, and cultural information.

Tasks 20%: Tasks will be set twice during the course of the term (which may consist of oral presentations and/or written assignments) and will be worth 10% each. Specific information about each task will be provided in class as well as on eClass where you will submit those tasks.

Oral Assessment 20%: This oral assessment is designed to assess your communicative abilities in Irish. The assessment takes ca. 10 minutes and it will resemble the oral activities that you have done in class up to that point. You will receive details about signing up and preparing as we approach the assessment date. The oral assessment will be done individually and will be administered between Oct. 30 and Nov. 5, 2020.

Written Final Assessment 30%: The written final assessment is cumulative and will assess reading comprehension, vocabulary, grammar structures, writing, and familiarity with cultural topics. It will be administered during the final exam period
