**Course Description and Objectives:**

This will be a research-intensive directed-reading course. The student will be researching materials regarding the Paulo Coelho's work in translation. The objective is to continue work on material gathered in last semester's directed reading that will feed into the student's MA thesis in Brazil. In this phase of the research, the student will analyze translations of Coelho's work into English and Spanish, comparatively against the originals. The student will organize the analysis around selected works and the key thematic/linguistic issue each work suggests. The student will produce 3 short papers (5-7 pages) that lay out the main argument of each chapter to be expanded on in the thesis. The student will also give an oral presentation on the project to a cohort of translation students at a time TBA. Student will meet regularly with instructor to discuss readings and progress of project.
