Course Description and Objectives:

This course will explore different mythological themes and topics in classic and contemporary instances of world literature. It will also introduce theoretical approaches in order to contextualize and examine the select texts. At the end of this course, successful students will be able to situate mythological elements in given texts and identify the texts' literary position in relation to specific mythological themes. Moreover, students will have developed their critical thinking skills, and will be able to compare and contrast texts from different mythological and literary traditions.

Class participation: Students will be offered class activities every session and their participation in the forms of individual/pair/group discussions/written reports will be evaluated throughout the course.

Exams: The two exams will test students' knowledge of the topics discussed in the two halves of the course. Students will be given multiple choice questions, short answers and essay type questions in these exams.

Response paper: Students are expected to hand in a paper (1000-1500) written on a title

from a reading list posted on eClass. Students are expected to analyze the text based on specific mythological topics and themes. These essays should be handed in on designated dates in the second half of the class.
