## **Course Description and Objectives:**

The objectives of this course are to hone students' linguistic and writing skills. The course will put the emphasis on analytic reading and on several types of written expression. The course is based on three main activities:

- 1. Exercises to acquire vocabulary and understand the fundamentals of structures and stylistics;
- 2. Writing and revision exercises;
- 3. Texts to read, analyse and comment.

By the end of the course students' writing in French will have greatly improved and they will have gained confidence. With writing their reading skills will also improve. They will know more about text types, syntax, semantics and pragmatics in French and how

grammar functions at all these levels.

#### **Texts:**

There is no required text for this course. All the material will be either distributed in class and/or posted on e-class.

## **Grade Distribution (see "Explanatory Notes"):**

All explanations will be provided in class in a separate Power Point posted on e-class. The length of individual compositions will be around 500 words and the group composition and the final assignment will be between 800-1000 words.

In this course, students are allowed to miss three sessions without penalty regardless of the reason for their absence (excusable or not), after which two percentage point per absence will be deducted from the 10% attendance and participation grade. It is recommended not to miss a session unless necessary.

#### Policy for Late Assignments:

Late assignments will **not** be accepted without prior arrangements made with the instructor for an extension **at the latest one day** before the due date. If no such arrangement is made **5%** will be deducted from the assignment's mark for **each day past the due date**.

**Important note**: Disruptive behaviour in class is a sign of disrespect both to the instructor and to your fellow students, and will not be tolerated. Activities, such as chatting, surfing the Internet, using or frequently checking your phone, studying for another class, etc., will result in a low participation grade.
