Course Description and Objectives:

The goal of this course is to introduce students to a variety of topics related to teaching Spanish as a second/foreign language. The topics will cover trends in language pedagogy, as well as issues in lesson planning, development of materials and activities, teaching the four skills (speaking, listening, reading and writing) and language aspects (vocabulary, grammar), and assessment. In addition to discussing and critically reflecting on these topics from a theoretical standpoint, students will have opportunities to practically apply the concepts discussed. Thus, while the course establishes connections with theoretical aspects of language teaching and learning, the main focus is on actual practices in instructional settings.

Learning outcomes

By the end of the course, successful students will be able to:

- critically reflect on their second language learning experiences
- identify and describe aspects of major teaching methods
- identify and discuss principles of communicative and task-based language teaching
- critically analyze teaching practices
- evaluate and critique teaching materials and activities
- design activities and tasks for language teaching

Explanatory Notes on Assignments:

Tests 25%

There will two tests, each worth 12.5%, focusing on the topics we will discuss in class. Test I is scheduled for February 26 and Test II is scheduled for April 9. The format of the tests and their specific content will be discussed in class.

Final project 25%

For the final project, you will have to design a task cycle for a language class incorporating the pedagogical elements that we will work on throughout the term. In addition, you will have to submit a critical description and analysis of your task cycle. The final project is due on April 23. Further details and guidelines will be discussed in class.

Task comparison 10%

For this assignment, you will receive examples of tasks that you will have to compare and critically analyze on the basis of the features of tasks that we will discuss in class. This assignment is due on February 7. Further details and guidelines will be discussed in class.

Reflection papers 20%

You will have to complete two reflection papers, each worth 10%, discussing your prior experiences as second language learner and your ideas about second language teaching. The first reflection paper is due on January 22 and the second one on April 4. Further details and guidelines will be discussed in class.

Homework 20%

Throughout the term, you will have to complete several short homework assignments, each of them worth 5% or less. The deadlines for these assignments will be announced at least one week in advance. Some of these assignments will be ungraded, but you will receive credit for having completed them.

GRADING:

Assessment of the individual course components may be in the form of numerical marks or letter grades. The final letter grade will be based on "a combination of absolute achievement and relative performance in a class" (University Calendar, Evaluation Procedures and Grading System). - For an absence to be considered excused, instructors will request adequate documentation to substantiate the reason for the absence (i.e. in the form of a "Medical Declaration Form for Students" https://uofa.ualberta.ca/arts/-/media/arts/student-services/documents/medicaldeclarationformforstudents.pdf). Please, note that a "Statutory Declaration" submitted at the end of term covering multiple absences during the term will not be accepted.
- A student must inform the instructor within two working days following the class which was missed, or as soon as the student is able, having regard to the circumstances underlying the absence.
- For missed exams or term work, no extension will be given after this deadline has elapsed and a grade of ZERO will be assigned.
- For an excused absence where the cause is religious belief, a student must contact the instructor(s) within two weeks of the start of Fall or Winter classes; and within three days of the start of Spring or Summer classes.
- No request for make-up for missed work or exams will be considered without proper documentation.
- Providing any kind of document(s) does not imply an automatic approval; it will be at the discretion of the instructor to accept or decline a document and/or grant the student's request for an excused absence.

In addition, a grade of ZERO will be given for any exams or assignments that are not completed or handed in as a result of an unexcused absence.</u>
