Course Description, Objectives and Expected Learning Outcomes:

Course Description: Beginners' Swedish (SWED 112) is a continuation of SWED 111. The course is designed to develop ability in reading and writing Swedish with a strong emphasis on the development of comprehension and oral and written communication.

During this process students will participate in a wide variety of interactive activities and be exposed to contemporary Swedish culture. Pair and group work are integral parts of this course. Such activities are designed to give students ample opportunity not just to actively practice speaking ability but also to develop language skills for real-life situations outside the classroom. Moreover, the inclusion of music and film will offer a unique approach to enhance students' awareness of Swedish culture while aiding in the practice of communication skills.

Course Format:

The format of the course is in-class. Throughout the duration of the course, you will participate in a wide variety of interactive activities and be exposed to contemporary Swedish culture.

Texts:

Explanatory Notes on Assignments:

General:

Announcements about tests, quizzes, homework, and other assignments will be posted on eClass. If you are absent, it is your responsibility to check eClass for the assignment. Due to the limited number of photocopies I am permitted to make per student, it is also your responsibility to check eClass daily and upon request to print out any additional handouts or assignments and bring them to class. In certain cases, electronic access is sufficient. Preparedness is your responsibility, so please have all necessary texts and materials when you come to class. In order to succeed in this course, it is highly recommended that you devote at least one hour per day to the study of Swedish.

Oral Work: Participation, and Attendance – 15%:

This portion of your final grade is based on your participation level during class, your willingness to take part in pair and/or small group work, your overall attitude and attendance. Unsatisfactory performance in this category will be reflected in this portion of your grade. This portion is based on the degree to which you:

- Attend class regularly, arrive on time, and remain for the entire duration;
- Are engaged and focused during both pair/group and individual work;
- Demonstrate you have studied the material and completed all written homework to the best of your ability;
- Show respect for your classmates' contributions to class;
- Take responsibility to ask for clarification of an assignment when necessary;

NOTE: You may miss three classes without an adverse effect to your final grade. More than **three** absences during the semester, however, will result in a reduction of your final participation mark. Please note, this does not mean you may miss more classes with a note, a valid excuse, etc. Three means three! Also note that <u>film screenings are required</u>.

Written Work – 10%:

This portion of your final grade is based on your written work (e.g. homework, short essays, and assignments completed in and outside of class). Short essays will be collected, corrected and returned with a grade. We typically go over homework together in class. In certain cases, answer keys will be posted on eClass. If it's apparent to me that you've not done the homework, it will reflect in this part of your grade. Whether you have a hardcopy of the textbook or prefer electronic you will need to bring paper in some form to class as well as something to write with! Please come prepared!

Quizzes – 15%:

Approximately every Thursday there will be a quiz covering material dealt with that week. I typically announce Monday or Tuesday what the quiz will be on. No make ups will be given. Quizzes are generally done at the very start of class, so avoid being late.

Midterm - 30%:

The midterm will cover all material taken up from day one of the course and will count as

30% of the final grade. This written only exam will take place Mon., February 24, 2020. If for whatever reason this date changes, you will be notified well in advance.

Final – 30%:

The final exam will cover material taken up since the midterm and will count as 30% of the final grade. This written only exam will take place Mon., April 20, 2020@ 9am. Location: TBA.

Cell phones, laptops, tablets:

As many of the materials you will be working with will be available in electronic form, cell phones, laptops, and tablets will be permitted for classroom activities only. Any other type of use is highly discouraged. If I feel you are abusing this policy, I will give you one email warning. If the behaviour persists it will reflect in your participation mark at the end of the course.

Notes on Grades:

According to the UAPPOL Grading Procedure Policy pre-determined quotas of letter grades in courses are not permitted, though Faculties may recommend grade distributions. Accordingly, on *March 11, 2015*, Arts Faculty Council debated and approved the following motion "The Faculty of Arts recommends that the class average in each undergraduate course fall in a range around the Faculty historical average grade for that course level . . ." The complete policy can be found on the Faculty of Arts intranet, but in

summary the effective range for each level will be:
