Course Description, Objectives and Expected At the end of this course, successful study	_

techniques to better understand how texts have hidden layers of meaning which can be isolated and analyzed. Furthermore, students will understand what kinds of close

reading techniques can be extended to texts read in translation, and what the limits of translation are. Finally, students will be able to perform analyses of short texts of various genres, and to communicate their discoveries effectively both orally and in written form.

Course Format: The objectives of this course will be learned through a combination of online asynchronous commentary, live discussion in Zoom meetings, and two assigned papers.

Explanatory Notes on Assignments:

<u>Class Participation</u>: Class participation will be counted through a combination of comments left on an online discussion forum for each assignment, plus oral discussion during our Zoom class sessions.

<u>Midterm Paper</u>: 1000-1250 words, no research citations. Students will chose a short text originally written in English, and write a close reading which explicates a surprising or unexpected meaning of the text. Students must submit their intended text for approval no later than Monday, Feb. 1.

<u>Final Paper</u>: 1250-1500 words, no research citations. Students will chose a short, translated text originally written in a language the student cannot read, and write a close reading which explicates a surprising or unexpected meaning of the text. Students must submit their intended text for approval no later than Monday, April 5.
